

**Keynote Address One:** Fortitude and resilience in troubling times: Scholarly pathways to hope and inspiration in global context

Prof. Tyrone Pretorius, Rector and Vice-Chancellor, University of the Western Cape

Professor Tyrone Pretorius is the Rector and Vice-Chancellor of the University of the Western Cape. He was Senior Deputy Vice-Chancellor at the University of Pretoria, overseeing Teaching and Learning, all faculties, and the Gordon Institute of Business Science. Previously, he served as Pro Vice-Chancellor at Monash South Africa. He holds doctorates from UWC and the University of the Free State and was a fellow at Yale and Oxford. He is an accomplished psychologist and is widely published. He received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the national Psychology Association(PsySSA) in 2001.

#### **Plenary Two**

**Keynote Address Two:** Under the eucalyptus tree: Lifescapes, radical witness and decolonising futures

Prof. Mohamed Seedat, Institute for Social and Health Sciences, University of South Africa

Mohamed Seedat, Emeritus Professor and Professor Extraordinarius at the Institute for Social and Health Sciences, University of South Africa, is a distinguished scholar, organisational leader, and mentor. Renowned for his critical compassionate scholarship, he engages with contemporary developmental challenges. His community driven work emphasises decolonial and liberatory knowledge systems, alongside building infrastructure and capacity for injury prevention and safety promotion in marginalised contexts. Mohamed has trained an influential cohort of next generation academic leaders, policymakers, and researchers now spearheading initiatives across academia, government, and industry. An accomplished author, his contributions span violence prevention, safety promotion, the politics of knowledge production, community psychology, and faith, spirituality and liberation studies.

# Bios: Panellists SANORD Conference

**Prof Shahnaaz Suffla** is a professor at the Institute for Social and Health Sciences, University of South Africa. Her research interests are located at the nexus of African, decolonial, community and peace psychologies, and public health, and are placed withinliberatory philosophies and epistemologies. Her work includes a focus on transformative epistemic and social practices in contextsof structural violence and systemic injustices, community well-being interventions, participatory engagement as a site of activism, resistance, and social change, and Africa(n)-centred knowledge creation.

**Dr Nick Malherbe** is a Senior Researcher at the University of South Africa's Institute for Social and Health Sciences and the South African Medical Research Council-University of South Africa Violence, Injury and Social Asymmetry Research Unit. His research interests include violence, visual methods, and discourse.

**Dr Thandi Gamedze** is an academic, a facilitator, a cultural worker, a writer, a poet, an educator, and a theologian. Dr Gamedze's research interests include theology, social justice, education, and the arts. She has broad experience working across multiple sites, including churches, universities, and community organisations. She has a background in physiotherapy and has worked as a researcher and associate lecturer at the University of the Western Cape. She has also lectured at the University of Cape Town's School of Education, and Department of Sociology, and worked for a number of years at the Warehouse Trust, an organisation which supports, challenges, and journeys alongside churches towards addressing injustice in their contexts. Dr Gamedze is currently based at UWC's Desmond Tutu Centre for Religion and Social Justice as a post-doctoral research fellow.

**Prof Abdulrazak Karriem** is a Professor at the Institute for Social Development at the University of the Western Cape. His research interests include urban and rural development, the role of social movements in promoting development from below, and thepolitics of migration studies in the Global South. Prior to joining the Institute for Social Development at UWC, he taught in the Department of City and Regional Development at Cornell University and in the Growth and Structure of Cities Program at Bryn Mawr College in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He also worked for the Department of Land Affairs (on land reform and rural development) andat the Department Constitutional Development (on provincial and local governance) during the Nelson Mandela administration. Prof Karriem is a collaborator on the "Migration And Food Security In The Global South: Interactions, Impacts, And Remedies (Mifood Project)," and also holds an African Academy of Migration Research (AAMR) partnership grant.
